## WHO ARE THE HOMELESS ?

Individuals, families, mothers, fathers, children, elderly -- people just like you.

- A spouse cannot cope with the responsibility of a family anymore and leaves a 14 year marriage. The remaining spouse, left with a teenager who is the mother of an 8 month old baby herself, has no money, no car and no job. What's next?
- A low income family has a house fire and loses everything. The little insurance they had may build a structure, but will not replace personal belongings. Rebuilding will take months. They end up living with a sister and her children in an already too small apartment.
- A family suffers from corporate downsizing. The household breadwinner is laid off. They have a little money in savings, but after four months of looking for work, the money is gone. One parent must stay home to attend to the three small children. They borrow money from family to last another month, but then where will they turn?

### FAMILY PROMISE OF ANOKA COUNTY

(FPAC) is addressing the severe homeless problem in Anoka County. In Jan. 2009, a study was done that identified over 1000 people without permanent housing, 365 of which were children living with families. Many others were not counted, those moving or staying with family or friends.

# FIVE Basics of the Family Promise Program

## 1. HOST CONGREGATIONS

Three to four times per year, for one week at a time, Host Congregations provide overnight lodging in their facility, meals (supper, breakfast, brownbag lunch), and hospitality. Housing rotates among the Host Congregations (no less than thirteen) for three to four families (up to 14 people) from approximately 5:00 PM – 7:00 AM. Support Congregations help provide resources.

## 2. VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are the lifeblood of the program. They provide a variety of services: cooking and serving meals, playing with children or helping with homework, and staying overnight. Beyond these services, volunteers interact with the guests, treating them with respect and responding with compassion. This is an opportunity for the whole family to volunteer on some level.

## 3. DAY CENTER

Each day the guests are brought to our Day Center, which provides a homelike atmosphere from 7:00 AM – 5:00 PM. The FPAC and Network Director's offices are also located there. Many of the guests are employed and go to work. Other guests work with the Network Director on finding jobs and housing. On average, 77% of the families who participate in the program find permanent housing. The Day Center has shower facilities, and washer and dryer to clean clothes. Children not old enough for school have a designated area at the Center.

## 4. TRANSPORTATION

An FPAC supplied van and volunteer or part-time drivers transport guests to and from the Host Congregation and Day Center. The van also provides transportation to employment interviews, housing searches, medical/dental appointments, and to social service agencies.

## 5. FUNDRAISING

Since FPAC is self-supporting, it is very critical to open and maintain avenues of funding for the program. It is estimated that \$125,000 will be required for start up and operating the first year. FPAC uses existing resources as much as possible, but there is still the need to employ a Social Worker, insurances, utilities, furnishings, and a number of other necessary items to make the program a success.
